

During the month of January, MVPD responded/handled a total of 6,109 calls/incidents. 3,105 House watch checks were conducted. 888 traffic stops were initiated with 873 citations being issued for 1,279 violations. (Note: 17 Assists in Hedwig, 149 in Houston, 1 in Spring Valley and 0 in Hillshire)

Follow-up on Previous Month Items/Requests from Commission

Staff have been working on the 2025 budget clean-up amendment and started work on potential amendments to the 2026 budget based on higher-than-expected increases in multiple line-item categories to include, TMRS, TML, healthcare, renewing contracts and licensing.

Personnel Changes/Issues/Updates

The department has received 2 applications for the position of Police Officer (one vacancy). The selection process has been initiated and is on-going.

Major/Significant Events/Updates

Multiple cases of mail theft and check washing from residents who mailed 2026 SBISD school tax payments have been received. V-Linc messaging was sent out to residents with instructions on how to pay taxes directly in-person. Investigations are on-going.

On 1/5/26 officers investigated a package theft case from a Bunker Hill home. The on-duty supervisor notified the evening shift specifics about the case as he had a hunch the suspect(s) may return. The following evening officers performing directed patrols, located and stopped a suspect who admitted to the theft.

1/13/26 a vehicle was stolen from a home on Saddlewood Lane. The ALPR was instrumental in assisting officers in determining directions of travel, and that the suspects had removed the victim's license plate. A new condor camera assisted in locating and identifying the accomplice vehicle and a primary suspect. (They left the area using a different route to avoid detection) The stolen car was quickly recovered by MVPD detectives.

On 1/4/26 officers stopped a vehicle on a traffic violation and located a juvenile female runaway who was in the presence of an adult male driver who was armed. The male was arrested and the female returned to her home.

Personnel conducted storm preparations the week of January 20th for expected freezing temperatures. Staff remained on call throughout the weekend.

Community Projects

Officers Boggus and King attended the annual BHE STEM Fair and conducted follow-up visits with Kinkaid and St. Francis Schools reviewing emergency alerts protocols and video surveillance access abilities.











- 2) strictly prohibits peace officers employed by the MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. from engaging in racial profiling;
- 3) implements a process by which an individual may file a complaint with the MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. if the individual believes that a peace officer employed by the MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. has engaged in racial profiling with respect to the individual;
- 4) provides public education relating to the agency's complaint process;
- 5) requires appropriate corrective action to be taken against a peace officer employed by the MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. who, after an investigation, is shown to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of the MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. policy;
- 6) requires collection of information relating to motor vehicle stops in which a warning or citation is issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, including information relating to:
 - a. the race or ethnicity of the individual detained;
 - b. whether a search was conducted and, if so, whether the individual detained consented to the search;
 - c. whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
 - d. whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury during the stop;
 - e. the location of the stop;
 - f. the reason for the stop.
- 7) requires the chief administrator of the agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, to submit an annual report of the information collected under Subdivision (6) to:
 - a. the Commission on Law Enforcement; and
 - b. the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency, if the agency is an agency of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.

The MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPT. has satisfied the statutory data audit requirements as prescribed in Article 2.133(c), Code of Criminal Procedure during the reporting period.



Executive Summary





Renewal/Marketing Summary

- ✓ **Fully Insured Medical Renewal** – BCBS released the initial renewal at a 50.6% or \$387896 increase over current rates.
 - We requested BCBS to provide additional rate relief. Unfortunately, BCBS was unable to lower the renewal rates.
- ✓ **Fully Insured Medical Marketing** –
 - Alliant requested BCBS to provide an alternate HSA compatible plan using the Blue Premier Access Network at 31.3% or \$239,850 above current rates. **The Blue Premier Access network is a narrow, regional (DFW/Austin/San Antonio/Houston) network with no Out of Network coverage.** This is a Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) plan that does not require primary care physician (PCP) selection.
 - This network has providers concentrated in the following counties: Denton, Collin, Tarrant, Dallas, Johnson, Ellis, Bell, Williamson, Travis, Hays, Comal, Bexar, Atascosa, Kendall, Bandera, Guadalupe, Montgomery, Harris, Fort Bend, Liberty, Hardin, Orange, Jefferson and Chambers. **Employees living and working outside these service areas will not have access to in-network care.** **NOTE: Waller, Walker, Brazoria, and Galveston County are not in network.**
 - The Blue Premier Access Plan will **have** to be paired with another PPO or PPO HSA Plan and can not be offered as a stand-alone plan.
 - The plan changes will include increases to the In-Network deductibles of **\$5000 Individual/\$10,000 Family** and Out of Pocket limit of **\$5000 Individual/\$10,000 Family**. **The plan does not have Out-of-Network coverage.**
 - Alliant also requested and received an offer from Curative. Curative is a PPO alternative medical plan meant to drive employee engagement by offering \$0 deductibles for members that complete a Baseline visit in the first 120 days. We received their quote which is fully insured and has a 1-year rate guarantee. **NOTE: Curative Plans are not HSA eligible plans.**
 - We would estimate their Single Option Fully Insured quote to be 30.2% or \$231,069 increase over current using assumed Curative migration. They are also offering a \$8,000 transition credit.
 - Alliant also received a Triple Option Fully Insured. We would estimate their quote to be 22.1% or \$169,584 increase over current using a cost neutral strategy where employees are encouraged to enrolled in the EPO plan. They are also offering a \$8,000 transition credit.
 - Aetna, Cigna, Deltek, Memorial Hermann, IEBP/TML, Plus PWXpress, Trustmark Insurance Company, UHC, Difference Card and Evry Health declined to quote or provided uncompetitive quotes.



Renewal/Marketing Summary

- ✓ **Medical Marketing** – Alliant requested the market to provide individual quotes for MVPD, Bunker Hill, and Piney Point. BCBS provided a quote with plan changes to the In-Network Deductible **of \$5,500 individual/ \$11,000 family** and Out-of-Network Deductible of **\$11,000 individual/\$22,000 family**. Total increase across all three divisions would be estimated to be 72% or \$548,796 above current rates.
 - **MVPD** - BCBS provided a quote at 76.9% or \$466,822 above current rates based off of MVPD's current population.
 - **Bunker Hill** - BCBS provided a quote at 65.8% or \$66,667 above current rates based off of Bunker Hill's current population.
 - **Piney Point** - BCBS provided a quote at 52.8% or \$15,307 above current rates based off of Piney Point's current population.
- ✓ **Dental Renewal** - BCBS of Texas released the renewal at a 15% or \$8,262 increase over current rates. We requested BCBS to provide additional rate relief. However, they were unable to accommodate. **Please note: Medical Rates are bundled with Dental and Vision. If these lines of coverage were to move away from BCBS, the Medical rates will increase without the bundling discounts.**
- ✓ **Dental Marketing** – We received quotes from Standard, Humana, and UCCI matching the current DPPO High Plan and DPPO Low Plan.
 - The Standard provided a quote at -7.8% or \$4,308 below current rates with plan changes.
 - DPPO High Plan - Decrease to the In-Network Individual Deductible **\$25** and the In-Network Family Deductible **\$75**. Orthodontia Eligibility age increased **up to age 26**.
 - Humana provided a quote at -7.6% or -\$4,171 below current rates with plan changes.
 - DPPO Low Plan - Increase to the In-Network Individual Deductible **\$50** and the In-Network Family Deductible **\$150**.
 - DPPO High Plan - Orthodontia Eligibility age increased **up to age 26**
 - UCCI provided a quote at -2.7% or \$1,469 below current rates with plan changes.
 - DPPO Low Plan - Increase Annual Maximum **\$1,000**.
 - DPPO High Plan - Orthodontia Eligibility age increased **up to age 26**
 - All other Dental carriers declined to quote.
- ✓ **Vision BCBSTX** - Vision remains under rate guarantee through 4/1/2027.
- ✓ **Life and Disability Plans BCBSTX** - Life and Disability Plans remain under rate guarantee through 4/1/2027







Executive Summary

The City regulates the construction, alteration, occupancy, and maintenance of buildings through the adoption and enforcement of a series of codes as codified in Chapter 4 and Chapter 6 of the City's Code of Ordinances. The City currently operates under the 2018 International Residential Code (IRC), the 2018 National Electrical Code (NEC), and the 2018 International Fire Code (IFC) which regulate residential and commercial construction, including elements of plumbing, mechanical and electrical systems, swimming pools, and fire safety.

New editions of these codes are updated on a three-year cycle to incorporate evolving technologies, construction methods, and clarify existing requirements. The City did not upgrade to 2021 codes previously. To align with current industry standards and best practices, staff recommends the City adopt the 2024 IRC, 2023 NEC, and 2021 IFC codes.

In collaboration with the Fire Marshal, BBG, and the City's Building Inspectors, staff have thoroughly reviewed the updated codes, ensuring they enhance safety, efficiency, and long-term benefits for the community. The proposed 2024 IRC and 2023 NEC editions will bring the City up to the most current published building codes. Key changes in the 2024 IRC and 2023 NEC include enhanced life safety requirements, expanded electrical protection standards, updated structural and wind provisions, increased emphasis on electric-ready and energy-efficient construction, and clarified code language to improve consistency in building plan review and inspections, and enforcement.

Staff recommends the new code provisions take effect April 1, 2026, to allow proper time to notify developers and contractors about the updated code.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends City Council approve Ordinance No. 26-665 adopting the 2024 IRC, 2023 NEC, and 2021 IFC codes.

Executive Summary

The proposed adoption of the 2024 International Code Council (ICC) model codes, 2021 International Fire Code, and the 2023 National Electrical Code (NEC) introduce notable updates affecting structural design, life safety, fire protection, mechanical and plumbing systems, energy efficiency, and electrical safety. This briefing outlines the most significant proposed changes and anticipated impacts for the City of Bunker Hill as part of City Council's consideration of a code update,

Key Proposed Changes in the 2024 ICC Codes, 2021 IFC, and 2023 NEC

1) International Building Code (IBC)

- **Fire & Life Safety:** Expanded requirements for automatic fire sprinkler systems in larger and higher-risk buildings; updated fire alarm and emergency notification standards.
 - Carbon Monoxide Detection: Expanded CO detection requirements in additional occupancies and building conditions.
 - Construction Fire Safety: Enhanced expectations for construction-site fire safety planning and system coordination.
 - Administration & Enforcement: Clarified authority of the Building Official, documentation for alternate materials and methods, and inspection readiness requirements.

2) International Residential Code (IRC)

- Mechanical Systems: Allows newer low-flammability refrigerants (A2L) with added safety provisions.
- Fire Separation & Site Design: Updated fire separation distances and clarification for multiple dwellings on a single lot.
- Structural References: Updated wind and load references coordinated with the IBC.

3) International Energy Conservation Code (IECC)

- Increased Energy Efficiency Targets: Higher baseline efficiency requirements compared to prior code editions.
- Flexible Compliance Paths: Expanded performance and trade-off options for compliance.
- Building Performance: Stronger envelope, mechanical system efficiency, and verification requirements.

4) Other ICC Codes (IMC, IPC, IFGC)

- IMC/IPC: Updates to equipment access, ventilation, fixtures, and coordination with accessibility requirements.
- IFGC: Clarified fuel gas installation and safety standards.

5) International Fire Code (2021 Edition)

- Alignment with IBC construction fire safety provisions, hazardous materials references, and operational permit requirements.

5) National Electrical Code (NEC) – 2023 Edition

- The proposed ordinance includes adoption of the 2023 National Electrical Code, which introduces several technical updates intended to improve electrical safety and inspection consistency:
 - Emergency Disconnecting Means: Expanded requirements for readily accessible emergency disconnects, particularly in residential construction.
 - GFCI Protection: Expanded ground-fault circuit-interrupter protection in additional locations.
 - Equipment Approval & Field Evaluation: Clearer pathways for approval of listed equipment and third-party field evaluations.
 - Load Calculations & Documentation: Increased emphasis on providing electrical load calculations when systems are modified.
 - Circuit Identification: Improved labeling and documentation requirements for panels and circuits.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS BY AMENDING ARTICLE IV, CONSTRUCTION CODES, OF CHAPTER 4, DEVELOPMENT, BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION, TO ADOPT THE 2024 EDITIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL BUILDING CODE, INTERNATIONAL MECHANICAL CODE, INTERNATIONAL PLUMBING CODE, INTERNATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE, INTERNATIONAL RESIDENTIAL CODE FOR ONE- AND TWO-FAMILY DWELLINGS, INTERNATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE, INTERNATIONAL SWIMMING POOL AND SPA CODE, INTERNATIONAL EXISTING BUILDING CODE, INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE AND THE INTERNATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE ALL AS PUBLISHED BY THE INTERNATIONAL CODE CORPORATION, AND TO ADOPT THE 2023 EDITION OF THE NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE AS PUBLISHED BY THE NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ASSOCIATION, INC., ALL WITH LOCAL AMENDMENTS; AMENDING ARTICLE IV, FIRE CODE, OF CHAPTER 6, FIRE PROTECTION AND PREVENTION, TO ADOPT THE 2021 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL FIRE CODE AS PUBLISHED BY THE INTERNATIONAL CODE CORPORATION WITH LOCAL AMENDMENTS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000.00 FOR ANY VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION HEREOF WITH EACH DAY CONSTITUTING A NEW VIOLATION; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas finds it to be in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens to adopt the 2024 editions of the *International Building Code, International Residential Code for One-and Two Family Dwellings, International Mechanical Code, International Plumbing Code, International Energy Conservation Code, International Swimming Pool and Spa Code, International Existing Building Code, International Property Maintenance Code, International Fuel Gas Code, the 2021 edition of the International Fire Code, and the 2023 edition of the National Electrical Code*, subject to the local amendments contained herein; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS:

Section 1. The facts and matters set forth in the preamble to this ordinance are hereby found to be true and correct.

Section 2. The Code of Ordinances of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas, is hereby amended by adding to Section 4-71, the language underscored below and deleting the language struck through below, as follows:

Sec. 4-71. Building Code.

The International Building Code, ~~2018~~²⁰²⁴ Edition, with all appendices, as published by the International Code Council, an authentic copy of which has been filed with the city secretary, is hereby adopted and made a part of this Code of Ordinances, except as follows:

(1) Section 101.1 is hereby amended to read as follows:

101.1 Title. These regulations shall be known as the Building Code of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "this code."

(2) Section 103.1 is deleted and amended to read as follows:

Creation of Enforcement Agency.

The City shall be responsible for the enforcement of this code. The Building Official shall be the official in charge thereof.

(3) Section 103.2 is hereby deleted.

Condensate shall not discharge into a street, alley, walkway, patio or other area which could become unsafe with the presence of water. A water level detection device conforming to UL 508 shall be provided that will shut off the equipment served in the event that the condensate line becomes blocked.

307.2.3 Auxiliary and Secondary Drain Systems. 1. An auxiliary drain pan with a separate drain shall be provided under the appliance on which condensation will occur. The auxiliary pan drain shall discharge to a conspicuous point of disposal to alert occupants in the event of a stoppage of the primary drain. The pan shall have a minimum depth of 1 ½ inches (38 mm), shall not be less than 3 inches (76 mm) larger than the unit or the coil dimensions in width and length and shall be constructed of corrosion-resistant material. Galvanized sheet steel pans shall have a minimum thickness of not less than 0.0236 inch (0.6010 mm) (No. 24 gauge). Nonmetallic pans shall have a minimum thickness of not less than 0.0625 inch (1.6 mm). Any appliance supports placed in the auxiliary drain pan must be of a noncombustible and non-deteriorating material.
2. A water-level detection device conforming to UL508 shall be provided that will shut off the equipment served prior to overflow of the pan.

The National Electrical Code, ~~2020~~²⁰²³ Edition, including all appendices, as published by the National Fire Protection Association, Inc., save and except the administrative provisions contained in Annex "H" thereof, and the ~~International Code Council Electrical Code 2015~~²⁰²⁴ International Building Code and the 2024 International Residential Code, as published by the International Code Council, authentic copies of which has been filed with the city secretary, are hereby adopted and made a part of this Code of Ordinances with the following amendments:

- (1) Minimum wire size for lighting and branch circuits is 12 gauge in areas of new construction. Number 14 gauge wire is not allowed for any purposes in areas of new construction.
- (2) All wiring beyond the electrical service meter must be copper. No aluminum wiring allowed beyond the electric meter.
- (3) All circuits, except those dedicated for specific appliances are required to be protected by GFCI, must be protected with combination breakers for arc and ground fault protection. A testing device shall be provided by the electrician at the final electrical inspection to test the arc and ground fault breakers at the receptacles.
- (4) Hallways and stair landings of at least 3 feet (914 mm) or more in length as measured horizontally along the wall shall have at least one receptacle outlet. The hall length shall be considered the length measured along the centerline of the hall without passing through a doorway. Additional receptacles are required for each additional length of 12 feet (3658 mm).
- (5) Receptacle requirements for kitchen islands. Any kitchen island with a work surface area, inclusive of sinks and appliances, of twelve (12) square feet or more must have a minimum of 4 individual receptacles generally distributed around the island.
- (6) Standby and emergency generators shall be installed in accordance with the National Electrical Code, 2020 and the following restrictions:
 - a. All wiring shall meet all requirements outlined in this code.
 - b. Maximum sound level at anytime shall be 70db or less measured at the property line.
 - c. Generator shall be positioned so that no structure, roof or overhang is over any portion of the generator enclosure.
 - d. Minimum clearance between the generator foundation and other structures shall be eighteen (18) inches or greater, or as determined by the manufacturer's specifications, whichever is greater. At no time shall the clearance be less than eighteen (18) inches.

- e. No portion of the generator or wiring may be located in an easement or right-of-way.
- f. Generator may not be located in any restricted area or required green space.

Exemption: A generator may encroach into a greenspace (excluding utility easements) provided it meets the following condition first:

- 1. The generator is placed no more than 18 inches from a structure.
- g. Generator may not be located within the required front yard of a lot.
- h. A generator cannot be visible from a public or private street.
- i. A load analysis, generator specifications and one-line electrical diagram must be posted with the permit on the project site.

(7) 680.23 Underwater Luminaires. All underwater luminaires shall be low voltage L.E.D.

(8) Wireless smoke detectors are acceptable without a signal communication wire if they meet all of the following:

- a. All detection devices must be of the same type and brand;
- b. All detection devices must communicate inter locally;
- c. All detection devices must sound simultaneously with an indication as to what area has triggered the alarm.

The auxiliary pan drain shall discharge to a conspicuous point of disposal to alert occupants in the event of a stoppage of the primary drain. The pan shall have a minimum depth of 1 ½ inches (38 mm), shall not be less than 3 inches (76 mm) larger than the unit or the coil dimensions in width and length and shall be constructed of corrosion-resistant material. Galvanized sheet steel pans shall have a minimum thickness of not less than 0.0236 inch (0.6010 mm) (No. 24 gauge). Nonmetallic pans shall have a minimum thickness of not less than 0.0625 inch (1.6 mm). Any appliance supports placed in the auxiliary drain pan must be of a noncombustible and non deteriorating material.
2. A water-level detection device conforming to UL508 shall be provided that will shut off the equipment served prior to overflow of the pan.

3404.2.9.5.1 Locations where above ground tanks are prohibited. *Except as otherwise provided in this section, storage of class I and class II liquids in aboveground tanks outside of buildings is prohibited within the city limits. The fire marshal may approve temporary storage of class I and class II liquids in portable aboveground tanks at construction sites. Storage by political subdivisions of this state of diesel fuel in aboveground tanks enclosed in concrete is exempt from the provisions of this section.*

Section 13. Penalty. Any person who shall intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,000. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.



Executive Summary

In January 2025, City staff met with representatives from Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church (MDPC) to discuss the proposed MDPC Master Plan. During the meeting, MDPC presented conceptual drawings and indicated the project was in an exploratory phase but anticipated moving forward.


During public comment at the February 11, 2025, City Council Meeting, Council heard comments from residents expressing opposition to the proposed Master Plan and concerns regarding potential negative impacts on their adjacent properties.

Since that time, the City has not received any formal updates from MDPC regarding the status of the Master Plan. While the City is aware that informal discussions related to the project may be occurring involving outside parties, there have been no additional discussions between the City and MDPC. The City is aware that MDPC has contracted with an architectural firm to continue exploring layout options, but no formal plans have been submitted for formal review by the City. Should MDPC move forward with the project, it would be subject to the City's formal development review process, including required public hearings and approvals from the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council.

This item is an opportunity for City Council to discuss the MDPC Master Plan directly with MDPC representatives.



Dear Mr. Barrera:

The Memorial Villages Water Authority is planning for the next year of capital improvement projects. In accordance with Section 12(b) of our Wastewater Services Agreement, the MVWA is required to provide the City of Bunker Hill notice of all planned WWTP projects by June 30th of the preceding year. The following projects are scheduled for calendar year 2026.

Project No. 1: 2026 Memorial Drive Rehabilitation Project.

This project includes rehabilitating approximately 6,500 linear feet of 24-inch, 30-inch, and 36-inch sanitary sewer trunk line along Memorial Drive leading up to the WWTP. The cost estimate including construction, engineering, surveying, and contingency is \$2,600,000, Bunker Hill's 35% share is \$910,000.00. Estimated construction start date is June 2026 with completion on or around January 2027.

Project No. 2: Carbon Air Filters.

This project includes rehabilitating the activated carbon Odor Control System at the WWTP. The cost estimate including construction, engineering, surveying, and contingency is \$704,000.00, Bunker Hill's 35% share is \$246,400.00. Estimated construction start date is April 2026 with completion on or around September 2026.

Pursuant to our agreement, in the event any unplanned WWTP Projects are required, we will provide the City with additional notice as promptly as possible.



Executive Summary

Consent Agenda Item C: Staff requested and received a proposal from Cypress Creek Mosquito Control, Inc. – the city’s current vendor – for citywide mosquito control services. Treatments are performed at night on a weekly basis from March to November and include all public rights-of-way. The frequency of applications may be increased as needed at the request of the City.

The proposed agreement provides for a three-year service period at a rate of \$392.00 per treatment.

Consent Agenda Item D: To supplement planning and development workload demand as needed, the City utilizes a third-party contract to perform building inspections and plan review services. TXBBG Consulting, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of SAFEbuilt, LLC, has provided these professional services to the City since 2022. These services are provided on an as-needed basis at the request of the City. Contracting with TXBBG gives the City the ability to deliver timely building inspections and plan review services, maintaining a level of continuity during inspector absences and periods of increased workload demand.

The second amendment to the agreement will continue these professional services through 2027.

Mayor Brown called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. on Zoom and in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 11977 Memorial Drive, Houston, Texas.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Brown led the Pledge of Allegiance.

III. CITIZENS' COMMENTS

There were no public comments.

IV. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE A SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS, AND IDS ENGINEERING GROUP IN THE AMOUNT OF \$207,624.00 FOR THE CONSTRUCTION DESIGN TO REPLACE GROUND STORAGE TANK NO. 1 AT TAYLORCREST WATER PLANT (WATER PLANT NO. 1) – *Elvin Hernandez, Public Works Director*

At the March 18, 2025, City Council meeting, Council approved a services agreement with the City Engineer, IDS Engineering Group, to perform inspections of the City's water tanks and wells to assess the reliability and efficiency of the City's water infrastructure.

The inspections evaluated the conditions of the water storage infrastructure at Water Plant No. 1 (Taylorcrest). The inspection report identified the need to replace existing ground storage tank no. 1 due to age and condition.

Based on these findings, staff requested and received a proposal from IDS Engineering Group for water tank design and construction phase services for the replacement of the ground storage tank. The scope of services for this work includes; site surveying, geotechnical investigation,

final design, bid support, and limited construction phase services. The new tank will be approximately a 242,000-gallon tank with similar dimensions to the existing tank.

Staff recommended awarding a contract to IDS Engineering Group in the amount not to exceed \$207,624.00 for the above mentioned services.

Funding for this work is included and was approved in the FY 2026 Capital Improvement Program (CIP).

The contract has been reviewed by the City Attorney.

John Hale, the City Engineer, attended the meeting to address any of Council's comments and questions. He noted that design is expected to be completed within six (6) months of approval.

A motion was made by Councilmember Thode and seconded by Councilmember Poor to approve a services agreement with IDS Engineering in the amount of \$207,624.00 for the construction design to replace ground storage tank No. 1 at Taylorcrest Water Plant (Water Plant No. 1).

The motion carried 5-0

V. MEMORIAL VILLAGES POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

A. Update on Activities – Chief Schultz provided an update on activities, including personnel, calls for service, and the 2025 Budget.

- The Department is expected to finish FY 2025 underbudget, and unspent funds will be returned to the three (3) cities. The unspent funds are due to personnel vacancies throughout the year.
- Officer Taylor – who was seriously injured in a motorcycle accident while working outside employment in January 2025 – has returned to full duty.
- The Finance Committee of the Police Commission is preparing budget amendments for FY 2026 that will be presented at a future meeting.
- Eight (8) grant-funded ALPR cameras have been installed, with one (1) camera pending installation. Upon completion, there will be nine (9) total cameras. The cities will have access to the cameras if needed. A live demonstration of the camera system will be provided at a later meeting date.
- MVPD responded to 2,272 calls for service in Bunker Hill Village during December.
- Due to proactive policing efforts, there were 154 more quality-of-life events addressed in 2025 compared to 2024. Overall crime decreased in 2025.
- Chief Schultz presented an overview of the current technologies used by officers to enhance patrol operations, response times, and investigations.
- Chief Schultz reported on recent thefts believed to be associated with an organized crime ring.

VI. VILLAGE FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

A. Update on Activities – Chief Croft and Fire Commissioner Pratt reported on activities, staffing, calls for service, and response times.

- The Deputy Fire Marshal position has been filled and will start on February 2, 2026.
- 97% of the FY 2025 budget has been expended.

- EMS revenue is expected to exceed original projections due to improved tracking software that has been implemented.
- The Finance Director will work part-time until a replacement is hired and onboarded.
- The average response time was 5:59 in November 2025 and 5:35 in December 2025 for Bunker Hill Village.
- The generator has been installed, and the unit is fully operational.
- The average response time across all Villages in 2025 was 4:16, which is 2.5 minutes below the national average response time.

VII. MAYOR'S REPORT

A. Report on Activities and Upcoming Events

- Mayors' Meetings – Mayor Brown reported on a recent public meeting held by the City of Houston (TIRZ 17) regarding a proposed 95 acre ft. detention project to be located near the Memorial Middle School campus. Although the project is outside the city limits, it will divert conveyance from W151 drainage ditch, resulting in a reduction of ponding in certain areas located within Bunker Hill Village. This will be a 3-year project with construction expected to begin in 2027.

Mayor Brown also reported that he spoke with Congressman Hunt's office regarding potential funding assistance for projects. A list of projects was provided to Congressman Hunt's office for consideration, including the Memorial/ Gessner project and water system improvements.

VIII. CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

A. Report on Activities and Upcoming Events

- Drainage Committee Feedback and Discussion – The Committee is waiting for FEMA to release the new flood maps before beginning updates to the City's Drainage Master Plan. In the interim, the Committee will meet in February to discuss localized drainage improvement projects. City Administrator Barrera requested Council recommend any drainage projects to be brought to the Drainage Committee.

Councilmember Thode discussed the maintenance of open ditches. He noted concerns that inadequate maintenance by one property owner should not negatively impact neighboring properties. He inquired about a bill-back system for property owners to ensure proper maintenance of open ditches.

- City Hall Office Closure for End-of-Year Administration and Records Filing – *Thursday, January 29, 2026, to Friday, January 30, 2026*

B. Public Works Director Report

- Development Report – Public Works Director Hernandez presented the permits issued in November and December 2025 and reported on the average changes for each permit type/ category between 2024 and 2025.
- CIP Project Update – Director Hernandez reported on the status of various CIP Projects:
 - The water modeling study is substantially complete.

- SCADA system upgrades have been completed, and all identified hardware has been replaced.
- Crews have started a pilot program to alleviate ponding and drainage issues at specified locations throughout the City.
- Crews are completing routine maintenance on open ditches and storm drains.

C. Finance Director Report

- Investments and Opportunities – The City continues to take advantage of favorable interest rates.
- 2025 VFD Ambulance Revenue Update – Revenue is anticipated to be \$90,000.00. Funds will be kept in the Fire Capital budget but will be booked as revenue for the City for record purposes.

Finance Director Grass reported that the FY 2026 Budget books have been printed and provided to City Council.

IX. PRESENTATION, PUBLIC HEARING, CONSIDERATION, AND POSSIBLE ACTION REGARDING AMENDING THE CITY'S ZONING ORDINANCE

ALL INTERESTED PARTIES SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT AND OPPORTUNITY TO APPEAR AND BE HEARD ON THE ITEM LISTED BELOW:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS AMENDING ARTICLE II, DEFINITIONS, OF APPENDIX A, ZONING, OF THE CITY'S CODE OF ORDINANCES BY AMENDING SECTION 2.01, GENERAL, BY AMENDING THE DEFINITION OF CORNER LOT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY OF AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000 FOR EACH DAY OF VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION HEREOF.

In response to feedback received from residents and recent events within the City, staff reviewed the definition of a “corner lot” as defined in Appendix A, Article II Definitions (Corner Lot) of the City’s Code of Ordinances.

At the June 17, 2025, City Council meeting, Mayor Brown reported meeting with residents regarding a new home build on the corner lot at the intersection of Blalock Rd. and Blalock Ln. The previous home on the lot faced Blalock Ln., while the new home has been constructed to face Blalock Rd. to maximize square footage. Additionally, the garage is now accessed from Blalock Ln.

Council recommended reviewing the ordinance and its application to new residential construction on corner lots. It was also recommended to review current regulations regarding the allowable proximity of garages to the roadway.

Council directed this item to the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission for further review and discussion of potential amendments to Appendix A, Article II Definitions (Corner Lot), of the City’s Code of Ordinances.

At the August 26, 2025, P&Z meeting, staff presented proposed revisions to facilitate discussion. The Commission inquired about the purpose and significance of this matter. Staff explained that City Council directed this item to P&Z for review and potential amendments. Additionally, this item also involves considerations of property safety, aesthetics, and lot setbacks. The Commission also discussed the importance of establishing clear language to ensure ordinances are interpreted consistently by both current and future city administrations. The Commission was in favor of amending the ordinance and directed staff to combine the original ordinance with elements of the proposed revisions to promote consistency in how new homes are oriented relative to existing surrounding development.

At the October 28, 2025, meeting, staff presented proposed revisions that reflect Commission feedback from the August 26, 2025, meeting. The Commission discussed the importance of allowing staff to exercise a reasonable level of discretion to ensure the orientation of new development remains consistent with surrounding homes. Staff noted the proposed revisions default to the least dimension, unless that orientation is not consistent with surrounding community development. Additionally, it also provides staff with the flexibility necessary to determine appropriate orientation for new development if needed.

The proposed ordinance was presented for a formal public hearing at the December 2, 2025, P&Z meeting. No public comments were received for or against the measure. The Commission voted unanimously to approve the ordinance and forward it to City Council for final approval.

A public hearing is required to be held before City Council, as the proposed ordinance amends the City's Zoning Ordinance.

Mayor Brown opened the public hearing at 6:25 p.m.

There were no public comments

Mayor Brown closed the public hearing at 6:26 p.m.

A motion was made by Councilmember Schwartz and seconded by Councilmember Thode to approve Ordinance No. 26-660 to amend the City's Zoning Ordinance.

The motion carried 5-0

X. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE A SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS, AND RED OAK CONSTRUCTION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$99,980.49 FOR CHLORAMINE SYSTEM REPLACEMENT AT WATER PLANTS NO. 1 AND NO. 2 – Elvin Hernandez, Public Works Director

This item was taken out of order and presented after item IV

An assessment of the City's chloramine treatment systems at Water Treatment Plants No. 1 and No. 2, completed in November 2025, determined that the systems are outdated and have reached the end of their useful service life. The assessment identified that existing critical chlorination equipment have been in service since 2004. Continued operation under ¹⁶¹

these conditions is not sustainable and increases the risk of equipment failure, potential negative regulatory or environmental impacts, and water service disruptions. Proactive replacement is necessary to ensure safe, reliable, and compliant drinking water treatment.

This project will replace the current chloramine systems at Water Treatment Plants No. 1 and No. 2. Work includes replacement of chlorinators, gas cylinder scale, flow meter, liquid ammonia sulfate (LAS) pump, monitors, and tanks. This work is expected to take approximately two weeks following equipment delivery. Any required shutdowns will be coordinated in advance to maintain uninterrupted water service.

In an effort to attain the best value and meet purchasing requirements, the use of interlocal cooperative purchasing programs allows the City to leverage the purchasing potential and benefit from economies of scale. All contracts are competitively bid and awarded in compliance with State procurement requirements. After vetting multiple competitive contracts through various interlocal cooperative purchasing programs, conducting background checks on similar projects, and evaluating overall competitive pricing, staff recommended awarding this project to Red Oak Construction, LLC, in the amount of \$99,980.49.

Funding for this work is available from remaining allocated water system ARPA funds, as well as cost savings realized from the Waterline Replacement Project.

The contract has been reviewed by the City Attorney.

Allyn Cheves with Red Oak Construction attended the meeting to address any of Council's comments and questions. He explained that the existing equipment will be replaced on a like-for-like basis and no service disruptions are expected as this work is completed.

A motion was made by Councilmember Poor and seconded by Councilmember Moerer to approve a services agreement with Red Oak Construction in the amount of \$99,980.49 for chloramine system replacement at Water Plants No. 1 and No. 2.

The motion carried 5-0

XI. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS, ADOPTING A SCHEDULE OF FEES, RATES, DEPOSITS, AND OTHER CHARGES FOR PUBLIC SERVICES, INCLUDING THOSE RELATING TO DEVELOPMENT, BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION, ELECTRICAL, PLUMBING, LICENSING AND REGISTRATIONS, REGULATORY INSPECTIONS, PERMITTING, APPLICATIONS, HEARINGS AND OTHER MATTERS – Susan Grass, Finance Director

At the recommendation of the City Attorney, this item was taken out of order and presented after item XII

As part of the annual budget process, staff reviews the building and development fee schedule to ensure that the rates are sufficient to cover the cost of services. The current fee schedule was approved at the October 21, 2025, City Council meeting. At that time, changes to the fee schedule included revised generator permit fees in response to state legislation passed in 2025 (S.B. 1202 and S.B. 1252), as well as new or adjusted fees related ¹⁶²

to utility reconnections, utility deposits for renters and contractors, animal control, solicitor registration, and other miscellaneous permits to align the fees with the actual administrative cost of providing these services.

Following additional review, staff presented a revised fee schedule and recommended consolidating the separate residential and commercial utility reconnect fees into a single, uniform utility reconnect fee. This approach is consistent with the utility reconnect fee structure previously approved by City Council through Resolution No. 11-19-2024A.

Councilmember Thode inquired how the \$75.00 reconnection fee was determined. Finance Director Grass explained the fee reflects the cost of service, including staff time and resources required to complete the reconnection process. He recommended increasing the utility fee to \$100.00.

A motion was made by Councilmember Thode and seconded by Councilmember Moerer to approve Resolution No. 01-20-2026 to adopt the City's building and development fee schedule and to amend the utility reconnection fee from the amount of \$75.00 to \$100.00.

The motion carried 5-0

XII. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS, BY AMENDING SECTION 16-31, RECONNECTION FOLLOWING DISCONNECTION; FEE, OF CHAPTER 16, UTILITIES, TO UPDATE THE AMOUNT CHARGED FOR RECONNECTION OF UTILITIES; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY – Susan Grass, Finance Director

At the recommendation of the City Attorney, this item was taken out of order and presented after item IX

The City's utility reconnection fee is established through two (2) separate but related mechanisms: the City's building and development fee schedule, which is adopted by resolution, and Chapter 16, Sec. 16-31 of the City's Code of Ordinances, which must be amended by ordinance. Both approvals are required for the utility reconnection fee to be valid and enforceable.

At the January 20, 2026, City Council meeting, staff presented an updated fee schedule through Resolution No. 01-20-2026, to consolidate the separate residential and commercial utility reconnect fees into a single, uniform utility reconnect fee.

Because the utility reconnection fee is also established in the City's Code of Ordinances, a corresponding ordinance amendment is required to implement the fee. Accordingly, the ordinance was presented as a separate item from the resolution to amend Chapter 16, Sec. 16-31 of the Code of Ordinances to align it with the fee adopted by resolution.

Staff noted that the ordinance is written to reference the building and development fee schedule adopted by resolution for the amount of the utility reconnection fee, ensuring the ordinance and fee schedule remain consistent.

A motion was made by Councilmember Thode and seconded by Councilmember Poor to approve Ordinance No. 26-661 to amend the City's Code of Ordinances regarding the utility reconnection fee.

The motion carried 5-0

The City holds its election on the first Saturday in May of each year. The election for Council Positions 1, 2, and 3 are held in even-numbered years, and the election for Mayor and Council Positions 4 and 5 are held in odd-numbered years.

At the November 18, 2025, meeting, City Council approved an interlocal agreement with Spring Branch Independent School District (SBISD) to provide municipal election services. The City will hold a Joint Election with SBISD to conduct the City's General Election on Saturday, May 2, 2026, to elect Councilmember Positions 1, 2, and 3.

Filing for a place on the ballot began on January 14, 2026, and will end on February 13, 2026, at 5:00 p.m. All candidate applications must be filed at City Hall.

A motion was made by Councilmember Poor and seconded by Councilmember Schwartz to approve Ordinance No. 26-662 to call for the May 2, 2026, General Election.

The motion carried 5-0

XIV. CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION TO APPROVE AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF BUNEKR HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS, BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 2-8, CONCERNING CITY HOLIDAYS, TO CHAPTER 2, ARTICLE I; AMENDING SECTIONS 4-5, 10-71, AND 12-5; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY – *Gerardo Barrera, City Administrator*

At the November 18, 2025, meeting, City Council approved the 2026 Holiday and Meeting Schedule. The following ten holidays are designated as observed holidays for City staff:

January 1, 2026	New Year's Day
February 16, 2026	Presidents' Day
April 3, 2026	Good Friday
May 25, 2026	Memorial Day
July 3, 2026	Independence Day
September 7, 2026	Labor Day
November 26, 2026	Thanksgiving Day
November 27, 2026	Friday after Thanksgiving
December 24, 2026	Christmas Eve
December 25, 2026	Christmas Day

On these observed holidays, City Hall is closed, and no building inspections are performed. Pursuant to Sec. 4-5 of the City's Code of Ordinances, construction and contract services (i.e., lawn maintenance) are prohibited on recognized holidays.

Currently, only seven (7) of the ten approved holidays – New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, and Christmas Day – are formally recognized in the City's Code of Ordinances. Because the remaining holidays are not designated as recognized holidays in the Code, construction and contract services are technically permitted on those days, even though City Hall is closed and staff are unavailable. This inconsistency has resulted in confusion among residents and building contractors regarding when work is permitted.

Ordinance No. 26-663 codifies the holiday schedule as previously approved by City Council to provide clarity, improve consistency, and eliminate confusion regarding permitted workdays for construction and contract services.

Councilmember Thode inquired about the necessity of this item, and that prohibiting contractors from working on certain days, such as the Friday after Thanksgiving, would require contractors to adjust their schedules significantly.

Councilmember Moerer noted that MVPD receives several calls on holidays regarding contractors working and expressed support for recognizing the designated holidays.

Council made no changes to the dates as presented.

A motion was made by Councilmember Moerer and seconded by Councilmember Schwartz to approve Ordinance No. 26-663 to amend the City's Code of Ordinances regarding City-recognized holidays.

The motion carried 4-1

Councilmember Thode opposed.

1. The parties to this Mosquito Control Agreement are **City of Bunker Hill Village** (hereinafter, the "City") and Cypress Creek Mosquito Control, Inc. (hereinafter, the "Contractor"), a Texas Corporation, with principal offices in Houston, Harris County, Texas.
2. In consideration for the payments to be made by City to Contractor, as recited herein below, Contractor shall be responsible for providing mosquito control application for **City of Bunker Hill Village** community in Greater Harris County, Texas. City shall attach hereto as Exhibit "A" a map, plat or chart, showing the layout of the said subdivision.
3. **The terms of this agreement shall be for three (3) years starting 01-01-2026 and ending on 12-31-2028.**
4. Contractor shall perform application at least once every week commencing the week of March 15th and ending the week of November 15th, weather conditions permitting, and in case of bad weather, as soon thereafter as is practicable (the "Application Visits"). However, in the event the City determines that additional applications are not caused by faulty work or breach of warranty by Contractor, **City may request Contractor to make additional applications at the agreed upon rate per Application Visits.**
5. The City shall pay a consideration of **\$392.00** (plus tax, if applicable) per application visit to Contractor for each actual visit made by Contractor to the subdivision for complete application. The Contractor shall submit invoices on the first of each month. Invoice terms shall be net fifteen (15) days. Price is based on map in Cypress Creek Mosquito Control's file.
6. Should the price of fuel increase to more than \$3.50 per gallon on average in the greater Houston Area (reported by the U.S. Energy Information Administration), Contractor has the right to add a fuel adjustment to the price of each Application Visit (the "Fuel Adjustment"). The Fuel Adjustment shall be determined by increasing the price of each Application Visit by the percentage of the fuel cost increase (Application Visit Price x (100% + the percentage of the fuel cost increase) multiplied by the Contractor's percentage of overhead costs attributed to fuel (8%)."
7. Contractor hereby warrants that the application Visits shall be performed shall in accordance with the chemical labeling.
8. Contractor is to provide:
 - (a) All necessary equipment.
 - (b) Equipped, trained and competent personnel adequate for the performance of Contractor's duties hereunder.
 - (c) Public liability and property damage insurance with limits of \$300,000 for damage resulting to one person, \$300,000 for damages resulting from one casualty, and \$50,000 property damage insurance for damages resulting from one occurrence.
 - (d) Responsibility for all existing local, state, and federal regulations relating to work performed under this contract.
 - (e) Workman's Compensation - Statutory
9. Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City against any and all liability which may be incurred by City arising from work performed under this contract, or from work which was to have been performed by Contractor under this contract, but which Contractor omitted to perform.
10. City hereby expressly disclaims any liability whatsoever or responsibility of any kind with respect to the choice of judgment exercised by Contractor in his determination of what chemicals or other materials should be used by Contractor in performance of the work provided for by this contract.
11. City designates the agent named herein below in this paragraph as its agent for the performance of City obligations under this contract. All correspondence between the parties shall be sent to the names and addresses shown herein below. - A. Plan Review.** All reasonable efforts shall be made by TX BBG Consulting to perform plan reviews when, at the request of the City, there is a need for immediate services. Digital plans shall be sent by a link or shared directory for review and paper plan sets shall be picked up by BBG within 48 hours from the time of notification from the City. BBG shall return the plans to the City with typed comments within eight (8) business days from the original date of notification. Plan review services shall be performed for a fee as detailed in Table 1 of Exhibit B.
- B. Building Official and City Planner Services.** Building Official and City Planner, Services. The Consultant shall provide the City of Bunker Hill Village with a qualified Building Official and City Planner to perform duties, as needed, to assist the Building Department in implementing procedures to make the building department more effective, advise and assist on zoning ordinance review & edits, project management, or other services as requested. Consultant’s staff shall make a diligent effort to recommend and implement agreed upon improvements. The city from time to time may request building code interpretation or explanation from the Consultant based on their expertise in this field. The final interpretive authority rests with the City. The services detailed shall be performed at an hourly rate for a fee as detailed in Table 2 of Exhibit B.
- C. Inspections.** Inspections shall be performed on an “as-needed” basis, upon notification of inspection request from the City. All reasonable efforts shall be made by TX BBG Consulting to perform inspections when, at the request of the City, there is a need for immediate services. Such inspections shall be performed at no additional cost to the City. TX BBG Consulting will provide next-day inspection services for all inspection requests received before 5 p.m. The services detailed shall be performed at an hourly rate for a fee as detailed in Table 3 of Exhibit B.
