National Public Safety Telecommunicator Week

Road Improvements Bunker Hill Rd. & Taylorcrest Rd

The City's contractor, Hayden Pavement, began construction on the southbound lane of Bunker Hill Rd. the week of April 28. Travel is restricted to northbound travel only between Memorial Dr. and Taylorcrest Rd. as work on the southbound lane is completed. Drivers should plan their travel routes accordingly and follow recommended detour signage during construction. Construction on Taylorcrest Rd. is tentatively scheduled to start in June after the school year.

The City hosted two (2) Town Hall Meetings to discuss the road improvement project. At the meetings, City staff, the project engineer, and the contractor shared details about the construction process, project timeline, and traffic control plans.

On-Call Services

The City's Public Works crews are on-call 24/7/365 to respond to water leaks and/or sewer stoppages on City lines. For immediate attention outside of regular business hours, nights, weekends, holidays, please contact MVPD Dispatch at 713-365-3700.

Code Enforcement Reminders

During the spring months, code enforcement violations increase. Properties are required to be maintained in compliance with City Ordinances to promote and protect public health and safety, and the appearance of the community. Review common code violations:

- Tall grass and weeds not only make the neighborhood unsightly, but may also create fire hazards, harbor vermin, and produce disease.
 Grass should not exceed 8 inches in height.
- Do not blow leaves or grass clippings into storm sewer inlets or ditches. Keep drainage ditches clear of debris to prevent drainage issues.
- Stagnant water in a swimming pool provides breeding areas for mosquitoes. Keep up pool maintenance to prevent fouling of the water.
- Property owners are responsible for the maintenance of trees and vegetation in right-of-way (ROW) areas. Keep trees and shrubs properly pruned to avoid causing sight visibility issues at intersections and sight obstruction of regulatory signs (i.e. stop signs, school zones, speed limit signs, etc.).

Prepare for Hurricane Season

Hurricane Season officially runs June 1 through November 30. The best time to prepare is well before the official start of the season:

- Develop an emergency plan
- · Build a disaster supply kit
- Protect your home
- · Sign up for alerts and warnings
